

ARCHITECTURE

## ESSEX, NY ARCHITECTURE

1. DOWER HOUSE – c. late 1870s-1900, oldest documented home in historic district
2. WRIGHT'S INN – c. 1790, oldest commercial building; now town hall
3. RALPH HASCALL HOUSE – c. 1800-1810, Georgian style home restored by ECHO
4. OLD ESSEX FIREHOUSE – c. 1800, offices turned firehouse / art gallery / residence / etc.
5. NOBLE WAREHOUSE – c. 1810, warehouse turned entertainment hall / Masonic lodge
6. W.D. ROSS STORE – c. 1810, limestone law office turned retail space
7. ESSEX INN – c. 1810, oldest operating inn within historic district
8. CRYSTAL SPRING FARM – c. 1811, Federal farmhouse
9. GREYSTONE COTTAGE – c. 1801-1818, general store turned community library
10. JOHN GOULD HOUSE – 1817, elaborate Victorian gardens once drew visitors from afar
11. OLD BRICK SCHOOLHOUSE – c. 1818, marks the site of town's oldest school (1787)
12. HICKORY HILL – 1822, most prominent example of Federal architecture in Essex
13. ROSSLYN – c. 1820, Federal / Greek Revival; former Sherwood Inn
14. BILLINGS STONE COTTAGE – c. 1828, stone Federal cottage
15. DR. SAMUEL SHUMWAY HOUSE – early 1800s, once home to town doctor
16. HARMON NOBLE HOUSE – 1835, brick mansion also known as Sunnyside
17. ST. JOHN'S EPISCOPAL CHURCH – c. 1835, originally a Ross family schoolhouse
18. BLOCK HOUSE FARM – c. 1836, site of 18th century blockhouse (fort / jail / court)
19. EDWARDS STORE – c. 1836, Victorian details; tailor shop / liquor store / rental residence
20. OLD STONE CHURCH – 1836, religious services ceased in 1922; original steeple removed
21. OLD BRICK STORE – c. 1840, simple commercial building with corbeled cornice detailing
22. EDWARDS HOUSE- c. 1941, built in Greek Revival style with colonial style roofs added later
23. CYRUS STAFFORD HOUSE – c. 1847, Greek Revival; brick and limestone construction
24. HENRY GOULD HOUSE – c. 1848, Greek Revival with Italianate / Gothic Revival detailing
25. NOBLE CLEMONS HOUSE – c. 1850, Italianate style with one of Essex's only flat roofs
26. ESSEX COMMUNITY CHURCH – 1853, rustic limestone; clock was not added until 1911
27. GREYSTONE – c. 1856, built of limestone with Greek Revival details
28. HARMON NOBLE SCHOOLHOUSE – c. 1850s, one-room Victorian schoolhouse
29. UNION SCHOOL – 1867, built in response to population "boom"; Moorish influence (belfry)
30. ST. JOSEPH'S CHURCH -1873, built for \$9,000 to serve Essex and Willsboro
31. WILDER HOUSE – c. 1870s, Second Empire style; one-time Agawam Inn
32. ROSSLYN BOATHOUSE – c. 1898, Eastlake (Victorian) design; historic Essex Regatta site
33. ESSEX HIGH SCHOOL – 1908, brick Romanesque school that closed in the 1960s
34. VAN ORNAM BUILDING – 1937, post office and cinema / art gallery / offices / etc.

\* Buildings are listed according to approximate construction date.
